

ROUTE 66 IN A LOTUS ELAN - BY PETER AND ALLISON COTES

For January's SCCON meeting at The White Horse in Trowse, about thirty members were treated to a lively and informative presentation given by Peter Cotes, ably assisted by his wife Allison. They described a trip they made last year in their Lotus Elan, driving Route 66 in America. I knew it was a primary route from East to West in the USA, but I learned so much more: Route 66 was established in 1926, starting in Chicago and finishing 2448 miles away at Santa Monica, California. Its fame partly derives from the popular song "Get your kicks on Route 66" and Allison played this to commence the story of their six-week- long adventure.

I had imagined that Route 66 was still a main freeway route but, over the years, it has been realigned several times in many places, so nowadays much of it remains as the original (barely maintained) narrow highway with the bustle of modern traffic travelling on wide dual carriageways, sometimes alongside the old road, but often many miles away. Route 66 as a primary route was removed from the U.S. Highway System in 1985. The remaining sections of Route 66 are now labelled as the "original 1926 route", or the "1933 re-alignment" etc.



Route 66 has become a tourist attraction and Peter described the vast number of rather kitsch edifices that have been constructed beside the old route. Less tacky are the old gas stations, many of which have been restored but they no longer sell any gasoline. Another unusual feature is the Musical Road in Tijeras, New Mexico which, if you drive at 45 mph will create tyre noise that plays 'America the Beautiful' (sort of).



Peter wasn't very keen on the row of up-ended half-buried wrecked Cadillacs in Amarillo. Apparently it is 'a thing' to go and spray your own graffiti on the Caddies, which seems to make them look even worse! The 'Art Installation' was first created in 1974, but was relocated in 1997 to a site two miles further away from the city. Maybe even the locals didn't like looking at it that much!

A huge thank you to Peter and to Allison who did all the audio-visuals and helped answer questions at the end. Their Elan has now done 280,000 (often very arduous) miles; that might even have surprised Colin Chapman.

However, I never expected that those words would come true is such a manner. As you will read from Sara's various emails the original route through Ethiopia is now not possible, simply because the Kenyan Government have closed the border, so the only way, completely overland is through Sudan, some of which really is a no go for tourists simply because the value of life there, well, is zero. It is too dangerous.

So poor old Julian and Robert are being forced to visit various game reserves, and look at the wild life there, which I add is really spectacular, and then having to recharge their batteries in one of the many club houses that adorn the game reserves. These in times long since gone were the homes of various colonial staff members, and very comfortable they are as well, as the facilities include a swimming pool(s). Here I must remind Julian of the song from Noel Coward, "only mad dogs and Englishmen go out, go out, in the midday sun". Of course, us lesser mortals are struggling to get through 6" deep snow!!!

By the time you all read this Julian and Robert will have taken the Riley 1.5 to the port of Mombasa where the vehicle will be put onto a cargo ship bound for the port of Dubai. As it is just a cargo ship it carries no passengers, so Julian will not be able to "hold the cars handbrake" (that is a play on words, like holding a child's hand! Think about it.) He and Robert will have to fly to Dubai, whether this is direct or via Europe I do not know.

I will now hand over to Sara, who had written some blogs. Unfortunately, they are not exactly in the correct order to read with this, so I hope David will be able to rearrange them in different date order. The only consolation of taking ship to Dubai, is the roads there and into Saudi are good, so I hope this will give a rest bite to his troublesome steering rack. Now please be advised, Julian, if you are carrying a camera, keep it well out of sight, especially at border controls, as some Saudi authoritarian control officers will take it from you and smash it.

7th February 2018

Julian and Robert left Cape Town 24th January 2018. Many of friends from Cape Town escorted them out on the first leg. They then went on to Johannesburg to stay with South African 'Riley' friends Janet and Roy Jones in via the Swartberg pass. A few car jobs there and more friends

escorted them out of JoBurg on Monday 29th.

Julian lost/had his phone stolen – he had not even left South Africa! Hopefully he will be more vigilant now. He has a new phone but has lost all his contact details.

From there they crossed the border into Botswana and on to Zambia and the Victoria Falls for a couple of nights.

He is now in Malawi at Monkey Bay on the shores of Lake Malawi enjoying a couple more days of sunshine and swimming.

As far as I know there have been no car issues and the 1.5 is rising to the challenge, but this is the easy bit.

If anyone interested who has a gmail account I am updating a map with his position on a daily basis which I can share with you. Unfortunately, it only works for gmail.

16th February 2018

Just a brief update re the Riley progress.

So far they have passed over borders from South Africa to Botswana, Zambia and on to Malawi (where they spent a few days). Lots of rain and muddy roads heading north along the shores of lake Malawi.

Car going well but some rattles in the steering rack started – It has been heavily greased and seems to be ok but just in case if anyone knows where a spare quick rack can be found –it would be good to hear from you - I can find standard racks relatively easily, but Julian feels an overhauled 'quick rack' would more likely have new parts and therefore be better.

From Lake Malawi they travelled over the border into Tanzania. Here they have spent 3 days with Robert's Cousin on a Tea Plantation and have just completed a 3 day safari in the Ruaha National Park. They are now in Dodoma – Arusha tomorrow and on to Kenya. He hopes to have a better look at the rack in Nairobi.

I don't suppose he is missing the freezing, miserable weather in the UK too much!

27th February 2018

An update on Julian's travel:

Some of you may already know the story so far as you have been in touch recently, others I have added to the mailing this time so I have included previous updates so that you have the full picture.

After the last update in Dodoma the travellers headed north to Arusha and the over the border into Kenya and on to Nairobi.



The roads were all fantastic newly built by the Chinese smooth flowing, steady gradients a joy to drive. The border crossing into Kenya was similarly modern and efficient having been recently rebuilt with EU money.

In Nairobi they made for Robert's friend Rick's house where they planned to stay while sorting out onward visa and addressing any car problems.

The car has been going well, greasing the steering rack provides temporary relief, but it still rattles over rough terrain. So far there hasn't been too much of that, so things are ok. A South African friend has stripped a Steering Rack he had and sent Julian some spare parts, but I understand it is a pig of a job to repair, so he is going to leave it for now. Expert friends in the UK have assured me that it is likely to be a worn bush with failure being highly unlikely. So, let us hope it holds out for the remainder of the trip.

Which brings me back to the trip - so far, they have completed some 4,500 miles. The plan was to travel up from Kenya into Ethiopia and Sudan to cross the Red Sea at Port Sudan over to Jeddah, and drive through Saudi Arabia to Dubai. Unfortunately, this is Africa and things do not always go to plan! A State of Emergency was called in Ethiopia on Friday 16th February, so that when they went to get their visas for Ethiopia on Monday 19th there was some reluctance to issue them. On Tuesday 20th the border between Kenya and Ethiopia was CLOSED. The alternative routes would be to go through either Somalia or South Sudan both of which are 'no go' areas, so all land routes to the UK are now blocked.

Plan B – regrettably the travellers now have no choice but to ship the little Riley 1.5 from Mombasa around the Arabian Peninsula and on to Dubai. This voyage takes some 14 days and the car needs to be a week at either end to sort out paper work. There are only Cargo boats on this route, so they will have to fly. No point into getting to Dubai too early however as the next country on the voyage home is Iran which can't be entered until after their New Year celebrations finish on 5th April.

The 'poor old boys' have had a few days to kill before they need to head down to Mombasa as the car doesn't need to be there until Monday 5th. So they have been off on another Safari – this time they flew into the Maasai Mara Game Reserve which it seems has been fantastic. They have even seen a leopard with a cub and a cheetah give chase to a warthog. After they drop the car off they will have a few weeks to enjoy more of Africa, Dubai and Oman before embarking on the next phase of their overland trip.

This had not been the ideal scenario, but at least that hadn't gone into Ethiopia and got caught up in the trouble but have instead been able to really enjoy the delights of African wildlife. It has also cut out the most dangerous and least interesting section of the journey home. Hopefully the car will make it and not get ambushed by pirates, so that travel can commence again in early April.

Ten entries: nine starters: nine finishers. Thank you to Mark & Lorraine for putting on another excellent event, a cracking route with straight forward navigation.

A big thank you goes out to the organising team and the marshals. From memory, and please forgive me if I miss anyone out or place them at the wrong control, course setter upper and boards: Mark & Brian, scrutineer: Mark, documentation: Lorraine, MTC1: Peter, David, Matthew & James, PC1: Alan, TC2: Andrew, TC3: Bryan & Paul, TC4: Ian & Christine, TC5: Ian & Christine, TC6: Mike, TC7: Matthew & James, PC2: Alan, TC8: Lorraine, Seb & Linda, course closer: David & Peter, results: Brian & Mark.

And now, my memories from the left hand seat of car 1. All our dramas came on the first section; a road closure required a re-route with a map section to follow before joining up with the original route plotted from the string of junction instructions to TC2 in GS2636. Long wait at the North Walsham traffic lights, marshal with a mal-functioning pen at PC1, a confusing triangle, local traffic in Trunch and finished off with a serious senior moment from the right hand seat when John's version of R@T GW wasn't quite the same as mine – all this left us just squeaking into TC2 well into our minute.

Grid lines to TC3 on the white in GS2038, a cunningly placed board on the slightly off-piste triangle in the middle of GS2037 caused much confusion, John was very keen that I should note the board and wasn't convinced by my "wait for the next section", possibly 7 out of the 9 crews were confused, some doing a better job than others at correcting their error. We were

pleasantly surprised to make the control with a couple of minutes to spare after following a member of the public very slowly from Lower Street to Thorpe Market. Herringbone to TC4 / 5 in the lay-by off the A148 at Hill Top via the interesting yellow up through "Lion's Mouth", plenty of not as map wriggly bits with large trees to catch the unwary, also bit of a senior moment from me as I managed to rip the navigation in half as it was over-enthusiastically removed from the envelope.

Time recovery section at TC5, giving John a chance to stretch his legs. We were joined by Robert & David on their minute, then there was a big gap with no cars. Quick chat with David confirmed that there had not been very many code boards on the route.

Spot heights and green dots to TC5 GS1336, nothing memorable to report. Grid square departs and a 22 minute section to TC7 in GS1432, by far the most challenging roads on the event. South of Baconsthorpe, south of Hempstead, run down the fabulous Pond Hills yellow (not one for the over-enthusiastic driver with a confident "you're on your own" from the left hand seat, very wriggly, muddy and lined with intimidating trees), loop around the north of Plumstead including the interesting double cross roads in GS1434, a sneaky board just after the 90L in GS1333, the tempting SO through gate at the entrance to Mannington Hall on the very straight yellow through GS1332.

For the final section to TC8 in GS2034 an array of neutered and reversed tulips defined the route. Another long section, Calthorpe, Wickmere, Aldborough, Thurgarton, Bessingham, manned PC at the cross roads in the middle of GS1835 (pen now working) and a final tulip in Hanworth (we did have a long and quiet look around most of the roads in and around Hanworth looking for a sneaky board, just in case). All that was left was a short run down the A140 to the pub for a drink, food and results.

Another good night's entertainment, with yet another excellent result from Matthew & Colin and Ben & Steve plus a tie for the top step between cars 1 & 2. One or two tie breakers were discussed, engine size was not enough, perhaps age of car, age of crew or far more interestingly weight of crew would have given a result but the usual practice, as far as Championship points are concerned, is to leave ties to stand.

As far as the 12 Car Championship goes it is all down to the final round, the Lyng Garage. Very close at the top between Matthew & Colin and Mick & Len. With best 5 from 6 to count and both crews having scored on all 5 rounds so far, as things stand Matthew & Colin on 47 (worst score 8) and Mick & Len on 43 (worst score 4). Should be an interesting evening, I'm sure Jonathan & Rob will come up with an interesting route.
