

The Ordnance Survey Puzzle Book



I started rally navigating on Ordnance Survey's 1-inch to the mile maps, and I've used their metric 1:50,000 maps since 1974. These latter maps, essential for all competitors on UK road rallies and SCCoN 12-cars were rebranded as Landranger Maps in 1979.

I admire the amount of information crammed onto every O.S. map sheet so perhaps it wasn't surprising that one of my birthday presents was this puzzle book from the Ordnance Survey, published last year.

Its format includes a series of map sections in a variety of scales and formats. The first 37 maps show quite small areas of the UK and the final three maps are what the O.S. call 'Network Maps' covering large areas of the country - the final map showing virtually all of England and Wales.

The book starts with a fascinating section on the history of the Ordnance Survey: did you know that most of the 6500-plus concrete triangulation pillars that were erected between 1935 and 1962 have more concrete below ground than in the part you can see above ground level? Accompanying each map is a further page of factual information and a page with seven or eight puzzle questions relating to that particular map. Most of the questions require good eyesight and careful scanning of the map to find the features that solve the answers to the quiz. It's a bit like a grown-ups' version of a 'Where's Wally?' book.



I started reading my copy and was surprised when the very first map, dated 1801, showed somewhere very familiar to me: Kemsing in Kent where my Auntie Joan (my Mum's bridesmaid) used to live. I once visited her by train and got off at Kemsing Station. When I came out of the unmanned station I was dismayed to find no housing in sight and no road sign to show which one of three roads I should take to get me to Kemsing village. Fortunately, I guessed the right road and on arrival at Joan's house she told me I should have got off the train at Otford station as it was nearer to her part of Kemsing than Kemsing station itself! That was the first map and, as I continued through the book, I found that I had a personal link to guite a few more.........

Map 1	Kemsing, Kent	As above
Map 2	Sunbury (near Heathrow)	The location of BP's technical centre that I used to visit between 1974 and 1978 while working for British Leyland in Birmingham.
Мар 3	South Woodham Ferrers	This new town in Essex is where I lived between 1979 and 1987.
Map 8	Blackpool Seafront	My Grandfather Charles Seaman was the MD of Heenan and Froude, the company that designed and manufactured Blackpool Tower.
Map 10	Whipsnade	A stone's throw from Ivinghoe - where I designed a bridge for the sewage works while working for SCCoN member Stuart Dobson.
Map 12	Kinder Scout, Derbyshire	I've ascended Kinder Scout twice. It's very difficult to tell where the summit is because the top of this Peak District hill is very flat.
Map 13	West Winch, Norfolk	Just south of Kings Lynn, West Winch is on the A10 that I use as a homeward route when the traffic on the A47 is bad.
Map 15	Penrith and Alston	The A686 between Penrith and Alston is one of the best driving roads in Britain. I've driven it many times on the way to see my sister when she lived in Cockermouth.
Map 17	Snowdonia	This map includes Snowdon summit, 1085m high at its trig. point, that I've climbed seven times by various routes (and I've never used the train!), and Tryfan at 917m high, that I've climbed three times.



THE ORDNANCE SURVEY PUZZLE BOOK (continued)

Map 20	Happisburgh, Norfolk	Being on the Norfolk coast, Happisburgh is somewhere I've visited frequently and where I used to stay overnight at a colleague's house when I worked at Lotus. The area shown in the book has also been used many times on SCCON 12-cars. And no, the book doesn't tell you the correct pronunciation for Happisburgh.
Map 22	Kielder Water / Forest	When I was running chase car for Norwegian Monty Karlan's Lancia Integrale on the 1988 RAC Rally, he broke down in Kielder Forest with fuel pump failure while lying about 30th overall. Tara and I visited Kielder Water while holidaying in Northumberland in 2007.
Map 23	Milton Keynes	While our son Mike was living in Oxford for six years, the roundabouts of Milton Keynes were on our route to visit him.
Map 24	West Thurrock, and the Dartford Crossings	This is a bit of a cheat because Ford's Dagenham and Aveley plants (where I spent time working for Ford in the 1980s) are just off the edge of this map. Though my Auntie Olive did cause the Dartford tunnel to be closed in the 1930s when her Ner-a-Car motorcycle caught fire in the middle of the tunnel.
Map 25	Port of Felixstowe	There's a link here to Map 22, because when Monty Karlan was rallying in Britain during the 1990s, I used to act as his customs agent which involved collecting his rally car (Lancia Integrale, Ford Sierra Cosworth, Porsche 911, or Volvo PV544) from Felixstowe and delivering it to the rally start.
Map 26	Gravelly Hill on the M6	Spaghetti Junction obviously features in many routes in the UK, but it was always on our route to visit Tara's Mum in Dudley.
Map 27	Olympic Park Stratford	When our son lived on the banks of the River Lea in East London, the area covered by this map (including the Arcelor Mittal Orbit Tower) was the view from the lounge window of his fourth floor flat.
Map 29	Swindon Works	When I worked for British Leyland in the 1970s 'British Rail Swindon Works' was a running-joke phrase that was applied to prototype car parts deemed to be over-engineered or too heavy to be used in a car.
Map 31	Pontcysyllte Aqueduct	This aqueduct by Thomas Telford lies to the south of Llangollen. Also shown on this map is the location of The Royal Hotel, Llangollen. When I first started road rallying on 1" maps in North Wales, roughly half of all the rallies held in that area finished at The Royal Hotel - and, unless you were one of the top twenty cars to arrive at the finish, finding somewhere to park was a bit of a nightmare!
Map 33	Nottingham	I used to visit my sister when she was at Nottingham University. I guess she won't mind me saying that it was quite a few years ago.
Map 34	Kirton-in-Linsey, Lincs.	Tara and I stayed here only last August in the George Hotel. We can thoroughly recommend it.
Map 37	Hadrian's Wall (part of)	Back to our holiday in Northumberland in 2007, exploring Hadrian's Wall was obviously one of the touristy things to do, and we looked at the very part shown on this map - it's just north of Hexham where some good friends of ours live on a smallholding in Steel with a splendid view across the Devil's Water valley. Steel is so small that to call it a village would be an exaggeration!

For those of you who've got this far, thank you for your patience because all the places I've mentioned are personal to me, and not necessarily of interest to you. But hopefully I've given you some idea of my increasing incredulity as I turned the pages of this book. When you think of all the places they could have chosen, it seems quite remarkable for me to have a connection to 21 out of 37 maps.

Why Marshal?

SCCoN member, Matthew Hodder, recently posted the below on the SCCoN Facebook page and I wanted to share it in Spotlight, as I know not all of you are active on social media.

If you've never joined us to marshal on an event, this piece perfectly sums up what it's all about and the sterling work done by marshals across not just the UK, but the whole world.

As Matthew says, without marshals, motorsport wouldn't exist, so we should always remember to be extremely grateful for their efforts.

Many people have commented on it and it has been shared across social media by SCCoN and AMSC, so we'd be grateful if you could all do the same.

"Why marshal? Well, not everyone can be a driver, or a navigator. If we don't have marshals, then we don't have motorsport and that would make us unhappy bunnies. So, I marshal. Last night I was out in the wilds, miles from civilisation and the furthest TC from the start / finish of the event.

Whilst navigators do it on the move us marshals are clever too. We head out in the dark to unknown destinations. We get ourselves down remote lanes with no pre-plotting and no envelopes. We find unique control boards without following instructions and we set up camp in gateways, on sugar beet pads and on grassy verges. Then we settle down. We may put up boards, if they aren't already magically at the side of the road and we shuffle paperwork whilst we wait and wait. Whilst we wait there might be snacks to devour or drinks to quaff and subsequent hedges to be watered.

Last night I listened to sheep burping, chewing and mooching about whilst I peered up at a pin cushion sky looking like navy velvet studded with twinkly bits. An owl passed close by and screeched as it went hunting. Then the cars started to arrive. Cheerful crews pulled up, cards were signed, numbers noted and envelopes were opened. Thanks were given and cars shot off into the dark. Then more waiting.

Us marshals don't pack up early, we wait until the proper time for the TC to close and then reluctantly pack up if we haven't seen all the cars. Last night I was two cars short when I finally picked up the control board at 22.15 but I didn't know what had become of the cars until I got back to the finish. It turned out that a puncture and a lack of time had prevented two cars from reaching TC7. I had to get back to the finish before too long. This meant a rather swift trip through back lanes to reach a B-road and thus return to Lyng. Food and drink, after an hour or so out in the cool of a spring evening, is always much appreciated by us marshals and it is gratifying to hear how crews have got on through the evening.

At the end of proceedings, us marshals potter off home, unpack our marshalling kit and hit our beds for some well earnt rest; ready for next time".
