



Event Report: Renties Ypres Rally 2019

A report from an event slightly further afield this month. I've always fancied crossing the Channel to see what rallying in Europe is all about and, having suggested the idea to best friend and fellow SCCoN member, Daniel Gallant, we decided to go and watch the 2019 edition of the Ypres Rally.

> This event is one of the biggest national rallies in Europe, with an illustrious history as part of the European Rally Championship. Currently the event makes up part of the Belgian Rally Championship, the British Rally Championship, the FIA R-GT Cup and the FIA Benelux Rally Trophy. There were two additional events running alongside the main rally – the Ypres Historic Rally and the Ypres Rally Masters, which was new for 2019 and seemed to have been created to allow Belgian stars Thierry Neuville and Nicolas Gilsoul to appear in their Hyundai i20 WRC!

Dan and I set off from Norfolk early on Thursday


morning, catching the Dover-Dunkirk ferry at 10am. The lunchtime arrival meant, after the short drive through France, we had the opportunity to stop off at a couple of WW1 sites on our way to the hotel. We both enjoy our history and, while Dan had visited some of these sites before, I had not. We were both keen to explore while we were there, and Ypres and the surrounding area is certainly not short of places to visit.

After we'd checked into our hotel, we headed into Ypres to collect our tickets, before travelling south to Nieuwkerke for the shakedown stage, which we were told was a must-see. We could soon see why - access to the stage was unprecedented compared to most UK rallies and, with multiple runs allowed, many of the local drivers in the national rally were using it as an excuse to entertain the crowds. Big sideways moments brought loud cheers from the staggering number of spectators that lined the route. After a long (and very hot) day, we decided to head back to the hotel at around 10:30pm, but there were still a few competitors throwing their cars around when we left.

> The rally got underway properly on Friday afternoon, so we had plenty of time on Fridav to visit a few more historic sites, including Sanctuary Wood on Hill 62, the museum at Hooge Crater and, most significantly, the German cemetery at Langemark and the Tyne Cot Commonwealth Cemetery. I won't go into it in this piece but, suffice to say, they are truly sobering places. It almost feels wrong to describe them as interesting or fascinating, but I would certainly recommend visiting the area if you ever get the opportunity.

Friday afternoon took us back to the rallying and we had a couple of spots lined-up; the first in the middle of Mesen, which saw cars coming through

a complex section in the market square that took them to the finish. The local fire brigade had put on a BBQ, while locals were selling drinks, so there was a great atmosphere and plenty of action when the cars arrived, with a couple of spins across the finish line and lots of big skids.

Next, we moved onto Kemmelberg and one of the more famous viewing areas, with the cars blasting through the trees, up a narrow, slippery, cobbled road. It was a popular spot and took the action into the darkness. The tricky change from tarmac to cobbles where we were caught-out a couple of crews and the climb up the slippery cobblestones was causing some of the 2WD cars some traction issues. It was great to see the cars running in fading light too – something we don't see enough of in the UK.

Saturday saw a full day of action and a slight change of pace for us. The Ypres Historic Rally runs to a different schedule to the main event, so we decided to set ourselves up just outside



Langemark on Saturday morning to catch a bit of the older cars, before then seeing the main field come through just after lunch. The weather was scorching, but we arrived in plenty of time and set ourselves up, resorting to umbrellas to shield us from the sun.

I fear I may cause a little controversy among some rally fans here, but I really can't get excited about historic rallying in the UK. Why anyone would want to watch a rally that is made up almost exclusively of Ford Escorts is quite beyond me. I have nothing against the cars themselves, but I think our obsession with them in this country is holding the sport back a lot in some areas.

This meant that the historic rally in Ypres was something of a revelation for me. Rather than a fleet of MK1 and 2 Escorts, the entry was a real mixed bag. The top ten was made up of Group A cars from the end of the 80s, including a Lancia Delta Integrale, alongside Celica GT4s, Sierra Cosworths and a Subaru Legacy. It was great to see these cars being used as intended – they're now a rare site in the UK.



For the RWD fans, there was still plenty to enjoy but, rather than Ford's little saloon, the rear-drive weapon of choice in Ypres was a BMW M3 or Porsche 911. Of course, there were still Escorts and Sunbeams, which were nice to see but, more than that, it was the variety of cars that made it a much more interesting rally than one in the UK.

With the historic field through, we grabbed some food from the on-site food truck and also enjoyed a cold drink or two. The heat was mega by this point (Saturday was well into the mid-30s) so we also had a little sit in the car with the air con on full blast!



We then found another spot to watch the Masters and main rally field come through. The Masters entry was small, but contained a couple of current WRC cars, as well as some older Group A machines, so was a good watch, while the main runners continued to battle for BRC (both Belgian and British!) honours.

Following Langemark, we moved on to Dikkebus, which was to be the last stage we would watch. Access to this was fun, with an extremely narrow road used for parking, meaning Dan's VW Golf was left very much in a field. A short walk took us to the spectator area, where we ended up surrounded by a group of British fans, and a

young couple that had travelled from Ireland. This was probably the best spot we had found all weekend, with a seat on the inside of a 90° right which required a (very rough) cut. You could then see the cars go off into the distance through a fast, flowing section.

Sadly, our time here would turn out to be short. The Masters field came through without issue, along with the top handful of R5 cars in the main field. After this, the cars seem to stop coming and the Police helicopter that had been following the rally all weekend appeared, hovering low near the spectator area. This was obviously some kind of local code that we Brits didn't understand, as all of the locals left the stage en masse while we stood staring at the helicopter! It turns out that Sébastien Bedoret and Thomas Walbrecq had gone off the road in a big way, causing the stage to be cancelled. They were both ok, but their Fabia R5 was looking decidedly second hand and was partly blocking the road. They had been tipped as real contenders at the start of the rally but had fallen victim to the challenging roads.

We debated trying to catch another stage and, while we did head in the direction of another, heavy traffic caused by the mass exodus from Dikkebus meant it would have taken too long to get there, so we decided to head back to the hotel, change, and then head into Ypres to eat and catch the finish of the rally.



We managed to find somewhere to park after some driving round (though there was a free shuttle bus service from the outskirts) and, having managed to catch the Last Post at the Menin Gate, we headed into the centre of town. This was probably the most impressive part of the weekend in many ways. To say the rally takes over would be an understatement. Skoda are big supporters of the event and they, along with sponsor, Renties, had erected a hospitality/service area that filled a significant portion of the market square. There were two finish ramps (historic and modern), along with pockets of cars being serviced all over the place.

The historic cars arrived just before we did, while the main field came in during the evening. Former Citröen WRC driver, Craig Breen, now co-driven by Paul Nagle, has been rallying all over Europe this year and is on top form, having won nearly every rally he has entered. Ypres was his first outing in the VW Polo R5 and he didn't disappoint, taking a dominant win, almost 46 seconds ahead of Kevin Abbring and Veronique Hostens in another Polo. Indeed, it was a VW lock-out, with Belgian Rally Championship regulars, Kris Princen and Bram Eelbode in third place.



In the British Championship, Tom Cave and Dale Bowen had a storming drive in the Hyundai i20 R5, but had to give best to reigning champ, Matt Edwards, with Patrick Walsh alongside him in the Fiesta R5. That's left them tied on points, so the BRC is finding its competitive feet again.

We had a great evening in Ypres, walking around, soaking up the fantastic atmosphere. It was still plenty warm, so there were countless people eating and drinking outside restaurants and bars. It was quite a surreal sight, with people eating an evening meal while rally cars rumbled through to the finish ramp and crews shared stories of the event.

Many of the shops and cafes stayed open late into the evening to benefit from the crowds and, when we left at around 11:30pm, the DJ had started up on the historic finish ramp, with plenty of people enjoying themselves and the Belgian beer!

Sunday saw us catch the return ferry and reflect on our experience. If you have never been to a Belgian rally, I can't recommend it enough. The people couldn't be more friendly and the way the event is embraced by the locals is fantastic. The route was compact, the stages easy to access, the food and drink reasonably priced (€1.50 for a bottle of beer stage side!), and the whole atmosphere inviting and very much like a festival. With closed-road rallies popping up in the UK, I hope the organisers take a bit of time to see how our friends in Europe do it, as they could certainly learn a lot.



We're already talking about going back next year and competing over there is now very near the top of the bucket list. Does anyone have an R5 car I can borrow?
