

Snippets

Binary Numbers

Binary notation in mathematics is sometimes used by road rally organisers in their more fiendish navigation clues. In a binary number each column is double the value of the column to its right.

So, a binary 1 = number 1, binary 10 = number 2, 11 = 3, 100 = 4, 101 = 5 etc.

Hence binary numbers use the symbols '1' and '0' and no others.

Computers use binary logic whereby '0' is represented by a zero value and '1' by a positive value. The brilliance of this system is that, within computer hardware, a '0' can actually have a minuscule value and the computer will still read it as zero, while a '1' value doesn't have to be accurate as long as it's significantly different from zero. This gives computers protection against electro-magnetic interference and, if some of the tiny individual charges stored in a computer change slightly over time, they still read correctly as positive values representing the '1's in binary notation.

It has recently been announced that the new £50 note will feature an image of Alan Turing, the World War Two code-breaker based at Bletchley Park, who was an early pioneer of computer science. The new banknote also shows the binary number 10101111111001011001. This can be easily converted into a decimal number using Microsoft Excel and the result is 23061912. Alan Turing's birth date is 23rd June 1912 so that long binary number is a subtle tribute to him.

Going off backwards - but it's not car rallying

Paddy and Mick were out watching the Circuit of Ireland Rally and they chatted while they waited for the cars to come past. "Paddy," says Mick "does ye have any other hobbies as well as rallying?" "Oh, to be sure, that I do" says Paddy, "I sometimes do some of that scuba diving down at Bantry Bay." "Ah Paddy" says Mick, "I've seen that on the TV". Then, after a pause: "I've always wondered, why it is that you scuba diving people always fall into the water backwards?". "Don't be so stupid Mick, if we fell forwards, we'd still be in the feckin' boat!"

Who or what was a Carman?

While researching my family history, I discovered that my great grandfather Frederick Hawkes was recorded in the UK census of 1881 as a 'Carman' living in Lewisham. But cars hadn't been invented yet, so what was a Carman? It meant a person who conveyed goods in a cart, usually horse-drawn, but the term also described carriers with hand-hauled carts. My 95-year old Mum used to visit her Grandad when he was in his late seventies and remembers that Frederick still had his horse and van (a cart with a box body), that he kept in a passageway between two shops. As a car enthusiast, who spent most of my working life in the motor industry, I like to think that I'm a 'car man' too.

Run-flat tyres

Most new BMW's are now supplied with run-flat tyres. In the 1970's while working for British Leyland at Longbridge I helped to develop the Dunlop Denovo, one of the earliest run-flat tyres. Denovos had little pots of lubricant secured around the well of the wheel. When a puncture occurred, the tyre would squash and burst these pots. The lubricant then reduced the heat build-up that occurred due to friction and flexing of the tyre side-walls. We had to get special permission from the Ministry of Transport to drive cars with deflated experimental tyres on public roads and they supplied documents that we carried in the test cars. I drove many miles in the wedge-shaped Austin Princess models, mostly on motorways, to establish the safe life of a punctured Denovo. Working with Dunlop, our recommendation was that a flat Denovo should be driven for no more than 50 miles at speeds not exceeding 50 mph. Incidentally, that's the same as BMW's current recommendation for a fully laden car with a punctured run-flat. I had a concern that the Princess rode, steered and handled so well with a punctured Denovo that many drivers wouldn't even realise they had a flat. If you drove gently, the only evidence was a little more under-steer (with a front puncture) and the steering wheel being slightly offset from straight ahead. From 1977, Denovos were offered as an option on new Princesses and were standard fitment on Mini 1275GTs. But they were very expensive and, when the factory-fitted set wore out, many owners replaced their Denovos with five normal wheels and tyres. Incidentally, a Mini 1275GT with Denovos (but no spare wheel), was very hard to get through an MOT test because there wasn't enough weight on the rear axle to get sufficient tyre adhesion for the handbrake to pass! BL used to submit three-year-old development cars for their MOT tests with extra weight in the boot. In 1980, after only four years, BL stopped offering Denovos. The Dunlop Denovo - another British invention ahead of its time? What do you think?


I'd like to take this opportunity to thank all of the members that
