


<p>12c</p>	<p>15,000</p>	<p>Thatch Thatch is an ancient type of roof covering for buildings. In the past many different materials have been used, such as heather and sedge. In this part of Norfolk, reed was freely available in the surrounding marshes. Reed is thought to be the best material for thatch because of its strength and durability. The roof here needed completely re-thatching in the 1990s repair. The underside of the thatch was lined with woven reed called fleeking. This can be seen inside the barn, and on the undersides of the single storey wings. The barn has one of the longest thatched roofs in the country. It took the thatcher a year to complete using 15,000 bundles of Norfolk reed.</p>
